Another mong was like this, "Thereis glory in my soul" "Since I lost my sins and found my Savior there is glory of in my soul."

It does not appear that we can do any more here than get glimpses of glory. But that is mighty good. I had a half dream the other morning. I saw our choir here, and every thing was bright and beautiful. The choir came in a processional from the back yonder. Some day when our choir has practiced some more I crave for it to enter in a glo rious processional.

Paul said, "And all of us, with faces from which the veil has been lifted, seeing as if reflected in a mirror the GLORY of the Lord, are being transformed into His likeness, from glory to glory, as it is given by the Lord, the Spirit."

Soren Kierk-e-gaard, the Danish Mystic lived over one hundred years ago but has just recently been discovered by the English speaking world. In some of the writings accredited to him there is a parable about a flock of geese in a barn yard to which he likened the Christians of his own day.

Every seventh day the geese paraded to one corner of the lot and heard their biggest orator gander speak on the wonders of geese. He told what great things they had done how their forefathers mounted up on wings and flew all over the sky. He spoke of the mercy of the creator who gave them wings so that they could fly. The geese applauded the preaching of the oratorical goose. All this they did but there was one thing they did not do and that was to fly They went back to their dinners and the security of the barnyard. Kierkgaard was too courteous to apply that to any Christians except those of his own day.

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We continue to hear about glimpses of glory that the vision of God gave to a select people whose names are buried in the Bible, and then seem to act as if those things happen no more.

We review the great things Jesus did, and then many of us go on living as though he was an historical being who lived centuries ago and was sealed in a tomb from which He never emerged.

There are people who will tell you that they enjoy read ing about great Bible characters who lived long ago, that they send their children to Sunday school, and think the church is a great institution but whose lives are as empty as a country church on a rainy Wednesday night be cades they refuse to let those idea; get down below the surface and change their personalities. We worship the form of the church instead of the Christ who founded it.

We must never let form and dress have any indication of taking the place of the inner spirtual condition. One person indirectly advised that I should wear striped trousers and a long tail coat in this pulpit. When I see how some ministers go for form I wonder what one of early Christians would think if he came back to the world and met one in the road.

One day there was a very ordinary looking little Jew going along a road in Palestine. If you had met him you would not have thought he was any thing out of the ordinary...but as he journeyed he got a glimpse of glory that changed his course in life and changed the course of history in the whole world. That man was Saul of Tarsus..He it was who said:

AND ALL OF US, WITH FACES F OM WHICH THE VEIL HAS BEEN LIFTED, SEZING AS REFLECTED IN A MIRROR THE GLORY OF THE LORD, ARE BEING TRANSFORMED INTO HIS LIKENESS, FROM GLORY TO GLORY, AS IT IS GIVAN BY THE LORD, THE SPIRIT

About forty years ago there was a young college student in Kansas. One day, in not as spectacular way as Paul, got a glimpse of glory. He wanted to be a medical missionary. He worked a long tme trying to some mission board to take him on. When one did take him they sent him to Arabia. With his scalpel in one hand and his Bible in the other he endered himsel to the people till the name of Paul Harrison became the synonym of life and hope to many a Moslem. His fame grew beynd the borders of Arabia., till a few years ago one of America's most widely read magazines wrote him up as one of the ten greatest Americans out sdie the United States. He had a glimpse of glory and did some thing about it.

There is something about life and human personality that tends to cause us to become what we pursue and persistently see... Man and wife get to looking like each other..one wife said, "Please save me from a thing like that." If we and tamper with evil too long it begins to be reflected in our lives. The same is true of the good. One farmer said "If we look at pigs all the time we get to be like pigs."
