gives him. we aim some thing to every alize . But what kind of a tree are you like? That is the important question. The Psalmist tells

us in another place that one man is like a green Bay tree. "He spreadeth himself like a Green Bay tree. This tree is one whose leaves Life Ce are useless. They fall beneath the tree and

are used again by the same tree. It spreads urecu out takes up a big lot of room and is useless. Self. This pictures the selfish man. He keeps
Man. all his property and never uses it except that
it make its returns to him. That kind of a man
usually takes up lots of room.

And he shall be like a tree planted—We never plant a tree unless we expect something from that tree. We may not expect fruit from every tree planted but we will expect shade—we will expect either kind fruit or no fruit to beautify the spot where we place them. Man shall be like a tree planted. Not just any man but the godly man—the righteous man. He is to bring benefit by beautifying the place where he stands.

He shall be like a tree planted by the rivers of water. He stands near the river and his feeders reach the life giving substance. It is a sign of success when a man strap close to God the source of strength. This will be evidenced by his attending the church in a worshipfull spirit and lining up and locating by the great river of life. As he grows his soul reaches deeper and deeper in to God's life.

You look at the throng as it passes by and you will behold those who are living by the river of life. He shall be like a tree planted by the rivers of water that bringeth forth his fruit in his season. That is he brings forth fruit when it is expected. Sharp disappointment comes to us when we look to a person for a certain piece of work-work that is important and then it does not happen. One of the greatest elements that can live in man is to do his duty when it is due to be done. Be on time with your fruits. It is said that Linbergh is always on time.

About all some trees do is to crowd out the undergrowth. Some people are the way willing to smother all others out if only they may rise to a high place in the world. This was not Christ's way. He would ever teach that the strong should help the weak and needy; the superman theory is an example of the former.

The emphasis of Jesus on trees was on fruit production. The figless tree has come down as

an example of what Jesus thought about trees
that do not do what is expected of them. He came
to it and found on it nothing but leaves. Well
would have been all right if He had expected
eaves, but He looked for figs. In fact many
crees produce only leaves but in doing that
do what they ought to do and thereby beauti
fy the ground. Too many of us however, want
to be leaf bearing when we ougt to grow fruit.
Oh but leaves give a shade for the passerby
by and he needs it. Yes he does but what is yu
your life worth if only people think of resting when they see you?

Are you the fruitless fig tree, the GREEN Bay tree, or the tree planted by the rivers of water that bringeth forth his fruit in his season?
